"This is the first year that we'll have nine teams taking part in the PUBLIC SPEAKING COMPETITION," she explains as she gathers judges, timekeepers and ancillary support plus liaising with the ESU's Education team's Matthew Christmas and Antonia Coleman-Harvey. The branch final on 29th January at **Lincoln University** will send the winners to Leeds for the regional final on 7 March. This year's

entries include De Aston School, Market Rasen, Queen Elizabeth's High School, Gainsborough, Caistor Grammar School, Carre's Grammar School, Sleaford, Newark Academy, and The Priory Pembroke Academy, Cherry Willingham.

The **Performing Shakespeare** competition kicks off in January and February leading up to June's Grand Final in Stratford-upon-Avon.

#### ACTION

The ESU Lincolnshire's resident expert, Jenny Wheeldon, education consultant and leader, reports from the classroom on programmes driven and funded by the local branch.

**WE** are delighted to report a really exciting year where both primary and secondary schools are embracing what we have on offer.

**Dr Tony Wood** (a champion of primary age children learning debating skills and author of *Speak Listen and* Learn) came to Lincolnshire to work with a group of pupils from East Ravendale. He spent a day with the class teacher and pupils, putting the children through their paces until they were ready to enter into a debate at the end of the day.

It was a fantastic day and really nice to see all pupils involved and contributing to whole class discus-Mr Sharpe

We replicated this training day with a further six primary schools who are part of The LSST training hub. The day was held at Ling Moor in North Hykeham. We had a delightful class of Year 5 (ie 9 & 10year old) children whose teachers sat with them on tables named after countries.

Tony soon put the children through their paces; what was so impressive was that those pupils not so confident at the start of the day found something through the guided activities to spark a passion and interest that enabled them to become quite eloquent by the end of the day's debating. I think even the class teacher was surprised at the progress that the children had made in just one day.

We plan to hold a debating competition in July with all six schools participating which will showcase their talents!

Thank you to **Donna Cavill** for coor dinating the day and to Ling Moor for hosting and, of course, Tony Wood for sharing his talents and

inspiring another set of teachers to embrace debating in the classroom.

Using the Tony Wood model seems to us the very best way of ensuring that debating becomes embedded in the classroom. We are already planning another session in the new year with another set of schools.

Also in planning is a day for 11 &12 year olds (Year 7&8 at secondary) with humanity teachers. This takes the pressure off English teachers to run debating clubs and ensures that debating skills are used in the wider context and across a range of subjects.


